Please remember us in your will

Be sure that the causes you believe in are supported when you are no longer here

Most people agree that it's vital that we all have a will (and that someone knows where it is kept). It's easy to put off, but we know many people feel great relief when they finally get round to putting their wishes in writing.

A solicitor will be able to assist you with your will and ensure that it is legally correct and that your wishes are carried out, including whether you would like to leave a legacy to charity. It is not a difficult process and not expensive either.

Please remember to keep your will up to date with changing circumstances. If you have already made a will and would like to include a legacy to the Rochdale RSPCA then all you have to do is contact your solicitor who can then make the addition – this is known as a Codicil. If you need advice, just give us a call and we will be pleased to help.

Without your generosity we could not continue For us, a legacy is a precious gift. No matter how small, it will be put to good use.

Your solicitor will advise on the correct wording, which must be quite precise - see example below. Remember also to state 'RSPCA Rochdale Branch' and not the Rochdale Animal Centre.

The Rochdale Animal Centre has joined forces with the probation service's Community Payback scheme.

The scheme supports offenders to carry out tasks for the Branch, such as bag and leaflet drops, sorting and cleaning second-hand clothes and painting and decorating.

"If we were to pay for this service, it would cost over £200 a week," says Shirley Mellor, branch shops coordinator. "This is a good example of how we can work with other agencies to benefit the branch and local animals."

"The offenders have really taken to the task because the work needs doing, and the Branch provides a valuable service," says the Community Payback supervisor.

"We can help offenders reform and also carry out work for deserving organisations such as the RSPCA."

Three lucky kittens

Linda, our senior animal care assistant, received a strange phone call at the end of August. The person on the phone described a situation and then said "The gueen has died and we are feeding the kittens on powdered milk". Linda had a feeling that there was something wrong. Although our cattery was full and we didn't really have much space Linda told them to bring them in.

Linda was on duty when this person came in and very delicately opened the box offered to her. Inside were four kittens laying still, one was very flat, not moving. Jean, the Centre Manager, was also on duty that day and immediately took the kittens to the vet for an emergency check up. All four kittens were found to be anaemic, emaciated, dehydrated, and absolutely covered in fleas. After some emergency treatment, the vet released the kittens but they needed 24 care so Linda offered to foster

RSPCA Week 2009

Results of RSPCA week 2009 show that a total of £302,000, countrywide, was raised, 10% up on 2008. £4,046 was collected by the Rochdale and District Branch - thanks to all of you who contributed and thanks to all those staff and volunteers who did the them and to bottle feed at home during the night. All three had gone through a de-fleaing process at the vets but, in spite of this, when Linda tried to feed them she couldn't get the bottle in their mouth for more fleas. Linda tried another tactic, putting some cimi cat on a plate, hoping the kittens would lap but no sooner had she put the plate down than it was swimming in fleas.

That first day was a real trial for Linda - she de-flead them again, and decided to give them all a good bath. To her horror, the water went immediately red with blood from the flea dirt. Before coming to the RSPCA Linda had worked for many years with cats in rescue centres and has never seen a case quite so shocking on tiny kittens.

With Linda's tender care 24 hours a day, the kittens are now really improving. They are not quite out of the woods yet but with luck should make a perfect recovery.

Human medicines -toxic to pets

This sad story shows how easy it is to think you are doing the right thing by giving an animal medication intended for humans.

Recently, a cat was brought in by someone who said they had found it on their doorstep and, thinking it had perhaps been hit by a car, gave it some Calpol to calm it down. After a few doses of this, the poor cat went into spasm and the alarmed lady came to us.

As we looked down at this poor animal, with its legs now rigid we knew we had to act fast. We immediately went to the nearest vet where, thankfully, we were given priority. Paracetamol was thought to be the likely cause so contact was made with the National Poison Unit to find the correct antidote.

The next problem was finding someone who had some. After a few hasty calls we were successful - Armac in Bury had some in stock. Our cat was getting paler by the minute so we dashed back to the car, put the cat on our lap, bandaged the drip to the sunvisor and set off once again. Armac were waiting for us and guickly added the antidote to the drip and put the cat into an oxygen tank. We all kept our fingers crossed. The antidote seemed to work at first but the vet suspected that the Calpol might have done too much damage to reverse the effects.

Very sadly, this little cat slowly lost the battle for life and died five days later.

Medicines intended for us really are deadly to pets so keep yours out of harms way and make sure all the family knows too.

Nora battled to the end



This thin tabby cat was called Nora. When she was brought to the Centre she was the same size as in the picture but had five kittens all feeding from her.

She was badly under weight and so were her poor kittens. We supplemented the kittens feeds and gave Nora five feeds a day to try and keep her weight stable, we couldn't afford for her

condition to worsen. Sadly, two of her kittens died and we decided to separate Nora from her kittens sooner than we normally would because, even though we were trying our hardest, her condition was deteriorating.

The three remaining kittens immediately improved, and Nora also started to respond to our attention, gaining a little weight. Sadly, for Nora, it was not to last. As the days went by it became clear she couldn't go on and shortly after, she passed away.

The Centre staff tried their very best and Nora's death has affected each of us. However, her memory lingers on and we are pleased to write this small piece about her.
