The RSPCA - 2 organizations in 1

Your *local* RSPCA works as a fast, effective task force to help animals in distress and, with animal's lives in the balance, *local* teams can deal with problems quickly and efficiently. Like all local branches, Rochdale has to finance itself which is where we turn to you for help.

There is of course another side to the organization. The national RSPCA has the task of co-ordinating all branches in order to create a nation-wide force. It also does other things like lobbying parliament, creating national campaigns and fighting for animal rights worldwide.

The national RSPCA looks after all the country-wide aspects of the organisation. It provides Inspectors for every part of the country. It campaigns for changes in the law. It prosecutes offenders (2,579 convictions were made in 2009). It sends out appeals to the public - you may have had them yourself.

It's work is crucial but very different to that of local branches. That's why we say it's two organisations in one and why we need to campaign to promote our local branch.

It is at local level where things move the fastest, where rescues are made and where the long slow job of rehabilitation and eventual rehoming takes place. Please support the RSPCA through your *local* branch.

Animal Centre's 5th Anniversary

Five years ago, in May 2006, after a very successful fundraising campaign, the Rochdale branch of the RSPCA re-opened the doors of it's Animal Centre on Redcross Street. Rebuilt, equipped with all the latest facilities and with a dedicated and enthusiastic full-time staff, the Animal Centre has achieved great things for the area.

Everyone in the Rochdale district should be proud that this amazing Centre, one of the best in the north of England has been created through the support and financial help of local people. Some of the things achieved in the last five years:

- 2,275 the number of animals we have taken in from inspectors and the public some literally starving to death. Imagine Rochdale with animals in distress where ever you looked? There are many places in the world where this is still a fact of daily life. In Rochdale we have taken a very active role to keep this situation under control.
- Education in schools. We have a constant rolling programme to educate young people in the importance of animal welfare.
- Advice. Pet owners in Rochdale should be some of the best informed people in the country judging by the amount of advice we are constantly asked to give - and are always delighted to do.
- Rehoming. Almost all animals make a full recovery - so strong is their will to live. Our rehoming figures show how many animals have found new and caring owners. Over the last five years this has averaged over 330 a year.



We are often asked to recommend toys and treats which are totally safe for your pet. They can sometimes be difficult to find but we now have a small selection in our shops. They are all \$1 or under so please buy from us and support the RSPCA.

Watch Out! A message from Jean, our Animal Centre manager

Cat litter deodoriser? Please don't use it!

The dangers were highlighted in dramatic fashion a few weeks ago when someone brought a cat to the Centre with dreadful burns on its tender underside. With the best intentions, they had wanted their house to smell clean and fresh and bought this product - a well known brand - and sprinkled some on their litter. The next time their cat used the litter tray she received severe burns - and not just to her tender parts but to her legs too. The damage was so

extensive that skin grafts would not have been successful and very sadly, and after much discussion with the vet and all concerned, the poor innocent cat was put to sleep.

This is not the first time we have come across problems with this leading pet care brand. Our advice is to purchase any pet product with extreme caution.



I would also add that with summer coming please be aware that commercial mulch products made from cocoa shells can, in the same way as chocolate, be highly poisonous to your dogs.




Am I only worth £10?

Please remember us in your will

Be sure that the causes you believe in are supported when you are no longer here.

Most people agree that it's vital that we all have a will (and that someone knows where it is kept). It's easy to put off, but we know many people feel great relief when they finally get round to putting their wishes in writing.

A solicitor will be able to assist you with your will and ensure that it is legally correct and that your wishes are carried out, including whether you would like to leave a legacy to charity. It is not a difficult process and not expensive either.

Please remember to keep your will up to date with changing circumstances. If you have already made a will and would like to include a legacy to the Rochdale

RSPCA then all you have to do is contact your solicitor who can then make the addition - this is known as a Codicil. If you need advice, just give us a call and we will be pleased to help.

Without your generosity the Rochdale Branch could not continue. For us, a legacy is a precious gift. No matter how small, it will be put to good use.

Your solicitor will advise on the correct wording, which must be quite precise - see example below. Remember also to state 'RSPCA Rochdale Branch'.


